
International Financial Institutions and Sustainable Development: Lawmaking and Accountability

Abstract



When the World Bank funds development projects in the Global South, it not only provides financial support but also shapes international law. This book bridges theory and practice by introducing researchers, teachers, and students of international sustainable development law to the environmental and social safeguard policies of international financial institutions (IFIs). It examines the case law of independent accountability mechanisms intérpret these that provide safeguards and remedies for individuals and communities negatively affected development bv projects.

By analyzing both the procedural and substantive aspects of IFIs' safeguard systems, the book clarifies how these institutions and other non-state actors elaborate and contextually operationalize sustainable development. Viewing international economic law and sustainable development through the interconnected economic, environmental and social dimensions of projects in the Global South, the book offers a valuable counterbalance to existing literature. It highlights how IFIs' legal and policy frameworks influence global development norms and underscores the need for greater justice and responsibility in international financial governance. It therefore ends with a plea that, given the IFIs' critical roles as creatures, creators, and catalysts of international law—especially regarding sustainable development—international legal scholars should begin taking them seriously and further scrutinizing their 'internal' rules and operations.
