## <u>Synopsis</u>

How has a credible commitment to legality been made possible under authoritarian regimes in Asia? Under what conditions would the transformation of authoritarian legality take place and move towards a liberal, democratic system? The contributors of this project are to compare the past the current experiences of China, Hong Kong, S. Korea, Japan, Taiwan, Singapore, and Vietnam and produce a comprehensive, comparative scholarship on this timely topic.
