As comparative lawyer Otto Kahn-Freund observed in the mid-1970s, there is a 'far reaching free trade in legal ideas. Far reaching, not all embracing'. We see this manifested in the law of privacy, whether understood in the traditional sense of freedom from intrusion into private life or some more extended sense of eg control over personal information and/or physical integrity stretching beyond the enjoyment of an intimate interior private life. On the one hand, there is a great deal of cross-fertilisation across jurisdictions as elements of the law of one are copied in others, allowing certain broad groupings to evolve. On the other hand, there are still many differences between and within these groupings which may be partly due to the different legal contexts of the laws but are also partly due to factors having to do with different social/cultural histories and norms. These tensions have ongoing implications for the protection of privacy in the digital century.
