Alessandro Chechi (PhD European University Institute, LLM University College London, JD University of Siena) is a post-doctoral researcher at the Art-Law Centre of the University of Geneva (Switzerland), where he teaches and researches primarily in the area of art and cultural heritage law. He is also lecturer in public international law at the Faculty of Law of the Université Catholique of Lille (France). He is a reporter for Italy of the International Law in Domestic Courts-Oxford University Press project, member of the Editorial Committee of the Italian Yearbook of International Law, member of the Global Legal Network of the Université Catholique of Lille, and consultant for the Art Law Section of the International Dispute Resolution (IDR) Group. He is author of the book The Settlement of International Cultural Heritage Disputes (Oxford University Press, 2014), and of other works on topics related to cultural heritage law, general international law and dispute settlement. Andrew Harding is a leading scholar in the fields of Asian legal studies and comparative constitutional law. He commenced his academic career at NUS before moving to SOAS, University of London, where he became Head of the Law School and Director of the Centre for South East Asian Studies. He joined NUS, as Director of the Centre for Asian Legal Studies and Director of the Asian Law Institute, from the University of Victoria, BC Canada, where he was Professor of Asia-Pacific Legal Relations and Director of the Centre for Asia-Pacific Initiatives. Professor Harding has worked extensively on constitutional law in Malaysia and Thailand, and has made extensive contributions to scholarship in comparative law, and law and development, having published nine books as author or editor. He is co-founding-editor of Hart Publishing's book series 'Constitutional Systems of the World', a major resource for constitutional law in context, and has authored the books on Malaysia and Thailand in that series (2011, 2012).









Hao Duy Phan is a Senior Research Fellow at the Centre for International Law (CIL), a university-wide research centre at the National University of Singapore (NUS). He is the author of many articles on various issues of international law. Prior to joining CIL, he worked as a legal expert at the Department of International Law and Treaties, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Vietnam, and a visiting research fellow at the East-West Center in Washington D.C. and the Institute of Southeast Asian Studies in Singapore. Hao Duy Phan received a B.A. from the Institute for International Relations of Vietnam, an LL.M. from the University of Notre Dame Law School (summa cum laude), and an S.J.D. from the American University Washington College of Law.



Irene Calboli is currently Lee Kong Chian Fellow, the Deputy Director of the Applied Research Centre for Intellectual Assets and the Law in Asia, and Visiting Professor at the School of Law, Singapore Management University. She is also Professor of Law at Texas A&M University School of Law, and Transatlantic Technology Law Fellow at Stanford University. She started her academic career at the Faculty of Law of the University of Bologna, where she graduated with firstclass honours, and held visiting research positions at the King's College London, the University of California Berkeley, the University Complutense, and the Max-Planck-Institute for Innovation and Competition. She is also a graduate of the London School of Economics and Political Science, and Queen Mary College London. She has taught modules for the WIPO LL.M. Program in Torino, the CEIPI/WIPO Program in Strasburg, the University of Nijmegen, the University of Amsterdam, the University of Essex, the Chinese University of Hong-Kong, the European Institute of Macau, and the University of Queensland. Irene specializes in Intellectual Property and International Trade Law. She has extensively written in these areas, and her scholarship has appeared in leading volumes, peer reviewed journals, and student edited law reviews. She is an elected member of the American Law Institute and currently serves, inter alia, as a member of the Executive Committee of the Intellectual Property Section of the Association of American Law Schools, and a member of the Executive Board of the European Policy for Intellectual Property Association (EPIP).





Jack Tsen-Ta Lee is an assistant professor of law at the School of Law, Singapore Management University (SMU). He graduated from the National University of Singapore in 1995 and practised for about six years as a litigator. In 2003 he completed an LLM at University College London on a British Chevening Scholarship, during which he studied cultural property law under Professor Norman Palmer QC, the Academic Director of the Institute of Art and Law. In 2012, he was conferred a PhD for research into the interpretation of bills of rights by the University of Birmingham. He joined SMU in 2008 where he teaches and researches constitutional and administrative law, and media law, while maintaining an interest in cultural property and heritage law. He was a 2009 Lee Foundation Fellow for Research Excellence, and won the School of Law's Most Promising Teacher Award for 2010-2011. He is a member of the National Collection Advisory Panel of the National Heritage Board between 2013 and 2017.



Jason R. Bonin is currently Research Fellow at the Centre for Asian Legal Studies (CALS) at the National University of Singapore, Faculty of Law, where he serves as Deputy Editor of the Asian Journal of Comparative Law and Principal Investigator for this Cultural Heritage Law Workshop. His research at CALS has generally considered the many roles that law plays in a wide range of urban governance issues, with the focus on cultural heritage being a more recent interest. Dr. Bonin holds degrees from the University of Florida (B.A.; J.D.), Leiden University (LL.M. (Adv.)) and the National University of Singapore (Ph.D.).



Kelvin Ang is the Director of Conservation Management at the Urban Redevelopment Authority (URA) of Singapore. He has over a decade of experience in both architecture and conservation planning. URA is Singapore's national planning authority, tasked with the mission to plan and guide land use in the country. URA is also Singapore's building conservation authority.

He obtained his Graduate Diploma in the Built Environment (Architecture), and subsequently his MSc. in Sustainable Heritage, both at the Bartlett School, University College London (UCL), UK. Kelvin has led a multi-disciplinary team to deliver several successful projects covering: research, planning and policy matters. These include the gazette of the Balestier Road area and the redevelopment of the historic Beach Road Camp. He was the URA conservation consultant for the showcase restoration of the NUS Baba House at 157 Neil Road.

His current portfolio includes developing public education and partnership programmes, overseeing Place Management efforts for selected Conservation Areas, as well as conservation enforcement work.





Kevin YL Tan is Adjunct Professor at both the Faculty of Law, NUS and the S Rajaratnam School of International Studies, NTU. A specialist in constitutional and administrative law and legal history, he has published widely in these areas, having edited and written some 40 books on the law, history and politics of Singapore. From 2001 to 2011 he was President of the Singapore Heritage Society, Singapore's leading NGO advocating for the preservation of Singapore's heritage.
